Hi All,

I trust the weather gods are being kind to you this summer. They have certainly forgotten how to make it rain here In Central Otago.

There are several activities currently occupying your executive team.

Firstly, the executive is sorting out the NZBGBA Constitution so we will meet our legal obligations as a registered Society. We are also taking the opportunity to consolidate and update the Society Rules and Regulations. These two documents will be circulated for your review and feedback prior to the 2025 AGM. The final documents can then be formally signed off at the AGM. My thanks to Marita for all the work she has put into preparing the new Constitution. Not any easy task!

Secondly, there has been ongoing discussions with exporters about how we as an association can work more closely with them to understand likely export requirements sufficiently in advance to allow breeders to make informed decisions prior to putting the bucks to the does in Autumn. These discussions are still in early days. We are also still awaiting results of negotiations in South Korea for two export contracts this Autumn.

Thirdly, the Wanaka A&P Show is rapidly approaching. We have taken the opportunity to invite Geoff Mitchell of Coomboona Boer Stud in Australia to be our guest judge. Geoff has shown Boer Goats for over 20 years and has held several senior roles in the Boer Goat Breeders Association of Australia. He has recently been working as a consultant on several large livestock breeding projects in the Middle East. Geoff will conduct an open discussion on the Friday afternoon following the judging. Come along and find out what we have to learn from our compatriots across the Tasman. Further details are in the next section.

CURRENT ACTIONS

- The executive have been working on updating the NZBGBA Constitution and Rules & Regulations and will present the revised versions at the AGM to be ratified.
- John has had conversations with exporters on behalf of the members.
- Planning for the Wanaka A&P show with judge and workshop.
- NZ Ag Show Specialist Livestock Zoom meeting 16 Dec 2024.

TRANSFERS OF REGISTERED ANIMALS

If you have sold animals and the purchaser wants to keep the animals and subsequent progeny registered, there are two major steps at time of sale. Ideally this would be completed as soon as possible, but is allowed up to six months from the date of sale (this is to minimize issues between all parties well after sale of animals).

1. Purchaser to become a member of the NZ Boer Goat Breeders Assn.
 - Form for new membership applications found in the membership section on www.nzbgba.net
 - Current membership is \$125 per year.
 - The purchaser nominates a stud name and three letter prefix and this is approved by the Executive (after checking against previously registered names and prefixes).
2. Animal registrations are transferred to purchaser.
 - Forms are found in the membership section on www.nzbgba.net
 - Each animal needs its' own form due to the details required on parentage, etc
 - Once the forms have been completed and signed by the purchaser, they get emailed to nzbgba@gmail.com.
 - The Vendor is then invoiced transfer fee/s by the NZBGBA.
 - Once paid, the NZBGBA will advise Genetic Gains to action the transfer of registered animals to the new owner.

It is the responsibility of the NZBGBA member to keep your herd register current. As a minimum, this should be on an annual basis with a completed kidding list (template is emailed out by Genetic Gains each year).

Contact Julia at julia@genetic-gains.co.nz for your current herd list & pedigrees, and update any animals on the register that have been sold (not for stud), died, etc.

NZ AG SHOW / CANTERBURY A&P SHOW 2025

This is expected to run as a “normal” full show this coming year, although it is possible that the days will change permanently from Wed-Fri to Thurs-Sat. The Board have the final decision. There was a motion moved and approved at the December General Committee of the Canterbury A&P Assn meeting that the name change back from NZ Agricultural Show to the Canterbury A&P.

It has been discussed by the Exec that for boer goat exhibitors it is too long to attend all three days (plus bringing in goats on Tuesday night) and unable to leave until Friday late afternoon at the earliest.

Jenny has advised the Specialist Livestock Committee that the boers would like to reduce a day of attendance as it would be less onerous for the exhibitors and goats that are travelling from out of Canterbury, who often stay four nights so the trip home is in daylight. If the show was Thurs-Sat, the boers would like to arrive Thursday night and have their competition on the Friday and leave Friday night or later. The dairy goat convenor also said they would like to show on the Friday, so there may be some negotiations required about either sharing the ring or setting up a second ring. As dairy goats lead and stand their animals versus boers who let them off and run in the ring for judging purposes, we would need to retain the existing ring which is of a suitable size.

It has been noted that the new NZ Ag Show board chair Sir David Carter was disappointed that livestock were not in attendance for all three days in 2024. The Livestock Competitions were held on Thursday and Friday and most departed on Friday evening, leaving the trades and sideshows. So there may be some pushback at a higher level that all animals are to be there for three days – although the dairy goats have only ever been there for two.

The next Specialist Livestock meeting planned for Monday 17 February has just been cancelled as the General Committee have not had another meeting since December, so further details will possibly be a couple of months away yet.

The executive would like to thank Philippa Loughhead for her many years as co-convenor of the boer goat section of the NZ Ag Show. Philippa resigned in December which leaves Jenny as sole convenor. ANIMAL HEALTH – GOITER

A goiter in a goat is a swelling in the neck caused by an enlarged thyroid gland. It can be caused by iodine deficiency or by substances that prevent the body from absorbing iodine. Some breeds of goat, such as Nubians and Boers, are more likely to develop goiter.

Iodine deficiency

Goats that graze in areas with low soil iodine levels are more likely to develop goiter.

Goitrogens

These substances are found in some plants and can prevent the body from using iodine. Goitrogens such as brassicas.

Symptoms

A swelling in the neck, below the jawline, and in the middle of the front of the neck

Weakness in kids

Poor hair coat in kids

Decreased reproduction in adult goats

Treatment

CONTACT YOUR VET TO GET PROFESSIONAL ADVICE & TREATMENT

Prevention

Provide iodine supplements, such as iodized salt, to the goat. Summit have an orange box, higher copper levels than the “all purpose” block.

Avoid feeding forages that contain goitrogens, such as brassicas.
