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## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I trust you are all having a successful Spring. From my perspective, Wanaka has avoided its usual September snow fall and the spring growth is proving very useful in getting this year's kids off to a good start. Main challenge is stopping goats being pigs and getting bloat!

Lots of NZBGBA matters happening currently. The Association now has its' new Constitution and Rules in place following ratification at the AGM. These updates were necessary to keep us compliant with the new Incorporated Society Rules. A copy of both of the Constitution and Rules is on the website [www.nzbgba.nz](http://www.nzbgba.nz).

Two things that became apparent when doing the updates were that we need clarity around registration of stock (see an article later in the newsletter) and our list of current stock (held on our behalf by Genetic Gains) is woefully out of date.

When buying and selling registered stock please promptly advise the Association of these changes. If you are having difficulties with your registration, please contact the Association. We are here to help!

The second challenge we face is keeping herd records up to date. This has two parts to it. Firstly, new stock needs to be registered as soon as possible after kidding. You should have already received your pre-kidding list from Genetic Gains. If not received please contact me. We ask that you complete your list as soon as possible after kidding. The other challenge that seems more problematic is regularly updating your herd lists. We effectively pick up those changes recorded via the registration system, but we are very poor at recording stock that have died or been sold as unregistered stock. Our current records would suggest we have a huge national herd and that is clearly not correct. While this may appear just unnecessary paperwork it is important that we know our total stock numbers. One significant reason is to be able to advise exporters the size of the national Boer Goats herd and hence likely availability of stock. So when you receive your kidding list from Genetic Gains please promptly update the list with both new kids as well as changes to your herd since your last update.

Other matters of interest include

- A lack of export opportunities at the moment due in part to unavailability of Air New Zealand aircraft doing direct flights to our markets. I will keep you advised of any improvement in this situation to assist with herd planning.
- The Association will be supporting the Christchurch Show this year with an overseas judge. This is a great opportunity to come along to get an overseas perspective of our

animal standards and also to network with other breeders. Entries close on 29<sup>th</sup> September so urgent action required.

- We will also support the Wanaka Show again in 2026 and planning is already underway. Put the dates of 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> March 2026 in your calendar.

Good luck with your kidding and I look forward to seeing as many members as possible at the Christchurch and Wanaka Shows.

## **WANAKA SHOW 2025 – WORDS FROM GEOFF MITCHELL**

I was privileged to be invited by the New Zealand Boer Goat Association to judge the 2025 Wanaka Boer Show for a second time after judging at Wanaka back in 2014.

The Wanaka show forms part of one of New Zealand's largest agricultural, pastoral & community events. Wānaka Showgrounds and Pembroke Park came alive, with livestock, agricultural equipment and products and a vast array of craft and home products and most importantly a lot of visitors.

The Boer goat section was extremely well positioned adjacent to the main entrance gate and judging took place on Friday morning. I was impressed with the number of visitors entering the showgrounds who wandered across to view the judging. Most people were intrigued by the goats and during my judging I was able to communicate to the public what I was looking for in the Boer Goats.

I thank the exhibitors from different parts of the South Island for making the effort to come and show their goats at Wanaka. Showing Boer Goats should not always be about winning ribbons, its more about networking and catching up with friends to see how they are progressing with their breeding programs. My observations from this show to my prior judging in 2014 is that the bucks have lost their masculinity and meat capacity whilst the does were a mixture of type lacking some width behind. At the completion of the show, we were all able sit down and relax with an open forum discussion.

I listened keenly to discussions on the issues confronting Boer Goat Breeders in New Zealand and also the commercial goat meat industry. Some of your issues are similar to what we are facing in Australia. I was asked many questions on my experiences with the Australian Boer Goat and commercial meat goat markets

It would appear, that we both face serious problems getting reasonable and cost effective access to Abattoir's. Covid and the current world financial situation had definitely impacted the demand for live export opportunities for fullblood Boer Goats

The Australian meat goat industry went through a significant growth surge on the back of high goat meat export prices. This flowed on to increased demand for commercial bucks and the prices paid, however a recent major downward restructuring of the export price grid has now eroded confidence resulting in low prices for bucks again.

We had some interesting discussions on how Australian breeders have improved the Boer Goats, particularly in the Red and Black solid coloured Boer Goats. Since the NZ genetic pool is much smaller, I suggested that the breeders work together sharing and using only the best bucks available. Your does determine your studs baseline path to genetic improvement, but this can only be maintained by careful selection and use of bucks.

The great thing about being able to sit down with other breeders and volunteers is the sharing of everybody's husbandry and farming experiences. I would urge all NZ breeders to make the effort to attend your shows even if you don't bring any goats.

On a social note, we all enjoyed a quiet dinner, beer and wine at Johns and Sandra's farm as the sun set behind the mountains overlooking Lake Wanaka. I'm told it's an annual event.



At the showgrounds on Saturday the goats were on display in pens attracting a steady flow of visitors. It's amazing to see the positive reactions of young children and teenagers to the Boer Goats and this all goes well the future of goats in New Zealand.

Finally, I would like to thank the New Zealand Boer Goat Association for the invitation to Judge at Wanaka and for the hospitality and friendships made with the exhibitors and volunteers.

## CURRENT ACTIONS

- NZBGBA revised Constitution and Rules & Regulations ratified.
- Ongoing conversations with exporters.
- Planning for Canterbury and Wanaka shows.
- Discussion on membership issues.

### **Discussion on NZBGBA membership – submitted to Executive by Jenny Bassett, May 2025:**

*Maybe we need to relook at our aims for the next five years and provide this as a working document - this is what we want to achieve by 2030 and reviewed annually until that point to keep the focus. Some discussion points may be:*

- *Increase membership by ?% each year (2025 = 18 as at the AGM, 2030 = ?) - and how do we try to achieve this?*
- *More annual register updates completed by members (number now from Julia & then future aim)*
- *Breeders Workshop - one every 2nd year?*
- *Judging school L1 - one every 5 years?*
- *Field visit - one every 2nd year as a minimum?*
- *Shows - continue with Wanaka & Canterbury each year with min 3 breeders exhibiting?*
- *Exports - work with exporting companies to get export orders successfully completed every 2nd year?*
- *Other things that might be helpful to say this is where we are at now, this is what we are aiming for by 2030.*

To help us with our aims and potential exports, we will be asking that you provide us with some data. In 2018, I (Jenny) organised a survey for members which was completed online via Survey Monkey. This gave us a snapshot of how many goats (registered & unregistered), what members wanted from the Association, what they attended, etc. Seven years ago we were concerned about the level of membership and it has reduced further now. We need to have some strategies to look at improving numbers of members and registered boer goats nationwide.

The Executive will decide what info we are wanting & you will be contacted in due course. We appreciate your co-operation with us to give us a better picture of where we are at now and potential to supply export orders, etc.

# TRANSFERS OF REGISTERED ANIMALS

If you have sold animals and the purchaser wants to keep the animals and subsequent progeny registered, there are two major steps at time of sale. Ideally this would be completed as soon as possible, but is allowed up to six months from the date of sale (this is to minimize issues between all parties well after sale of animals).

1. Purchaser to become a member of the NZ Boer Goat Breeders Assn.
  - Form for new membership applications found in the membership section on [www.nzbgba.nz](http://www.nzbgba.nz)
  - Current membership is \$125 per year.
  - The purchaser nominates a stud name and three letter prefix and this is approved by the Executive (after checking against previously registered names and prefixes).
2. Animal registrations are transferred to purchaser.
  - Forms are found in the membership section on [www.nzbgba.nz](http://www.nzbgba.nz)
  - Each animal needs its' own form due to the details required on parentage, etc
  - Once the forms have been completed and signed by the purchaser, they get emailed to [nzbgba@gmail.com](mailto:nzbgba@gmail.com).
  - The Vendor is then invoiced transfer fee/s by the NZBGBA.
  - Once paid, the NZBGBA will advise Genetic Gains to action the transfer of registered animals to the new owner.

It is the responsibility of the NZBGBA member to keep your herd register current. As a minimum, this should be on an annual basis with a completed kidding list (template is emailed out by Genetic Gains each year).

Contact Julia at [julia@genetic-gains.co.nz](mailto:julia@genetic-gains.co.nz) for your current herd list & pedigrees, and update any animals on the register that have been sold (not for stud), died, etc.

## EXPORT ENQUIRIES

Currently there are export enquiries for animals and semen which are in the early stages. No details as yet as to price, weights, contract, etc.

As with any export, it is not guaranteed until the goats have been paid for so if there are other opportunities for sales it may be recommended to take them. The NZBGBA advise potential overseas interests about the need for forward planning by the purchasers and exporters so that the breeders can make the appropriate decisions about their progeny.

## CAROLE AXTON

Carole is a long-term Boer Goat breeder from the southern part of Victoria Australia., who now lives in Queensland.

Carole began her journey with Boer goats in the early 1990's while visiting a NZ quarantine station inspecting the new South African Angora goats. Having seen Boer goats there, she was most impressed with their appearance and potential. When the Boers were released from quarantine, her stud combined the genetics imported from NZ, together with other genetics imported direct from South Africa around year 2000.

Carole was one of the first established Boer goat Studs in Australia and successfully bred between 100 to 300 registered does a year.

Carole has shown Boer goats at National, State and local shows, as well as breeding and exporting Boers to various countries. She is a 10-year experienced registered BGBAA Boer goat judge, as well as having special interest in providing training programs, breeders workshops, and husbandry information days.
